American Rhodes Scholars-elect for 2024

DISTRICT 1

Massachusetts

Mira-Rose Kingsbury Lee, Cambridge, is a senior at Harvard University with a double major in Human Evolutionary Biology and History. Her scientific thesis focuses on the effects of industrialization on the gut microbiome and possible impacts on human health, including metabolic and autoimmune disorders. She was awarded the 2023 Harvard-Magdalene fellowship at Cambridge University for her research towards a proposed pop-science book aimed at engaging the lay public on climate change from a microscopic perspective and outlining potential microbial solutions to the climate crisis. An ice hockey aficionado, Mira-Rose also writes musicals, including "Atalanta," which made its international debut at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. She participated in a not-for-profit to teach science and ethics to college-bound students from underserved communities in New York City. At Oxford, she hopes to pursue a Masters or DPhil in Interdisciplinary Bioscience.

Massachusetts

Lyndsey R. Mugford, Cambridge, is a senior at Harvard University where she majors in Human Developmental and Regenerative Biology. Lyndsey's thesis is on how somatosensory dysfunction impacts neurodevelopment in autism. She plans to apply this neurodevelopmental research to study regenerative therapeutics for peripheral neuropathy with an interest in addressing chronic and age-related pain. Lyndsey has volunteered regularly at the Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program and was a cast member and leader in Harvard's Hasty Pudding Theatricals, where she was elected as the first female Cast Vice President in the company's 178year history and President. At Oxford, she will pursue an M.Sc. by Research in Clinical Neurosciences.

DISTRICT 2

New Hampshire

Zachary Lang, Franconia, graduated summa cum laude from Dartmouth College in June 2023 with a B.A. in Philosophy and a B.A. in History and is currently working as an English Teaching Assistant through the Fulbright Program. Zachary's thesis was on the epistemic defects of ideological beliefs for which he won the Story Philosophy Prize. He has conducted research in meta-ethics, philosophy of law, and conceptual engineering. He was also a winner of the Charles Downer Hazen Prize in History. Zachary co-led the Student and Presidential Committee on Sexual Assault. He is fluent in French and German and is an avid rock climber. Zachary will pursue a Bachelor's in Philosophy at Oxford.

New Jersey

Samuel J. Harshbarger, Cranbury, is a senior at Princeton University where he majors in History. His studies focus on twentieth-century Turkey, the Cold War, and decolonization. Sam is also a Research Assistant at the Foreign Policy Research Institute. He was granted the Stone Davis Thesis Award to fund his senior thesis archival research in Ankara, Turkey.
