What is the Rhodes Scholarship?



The Rhodes Scholarship was established through the Will of Cecil John Rhodes in 1902. Over a hundred years later, the Rhodes Scholarships are the oldest and perhaps most prestigious international scholarship programme in the world.

Our reputation as the world's most distinguished academic scholarship rests not on the controversial life of our founder Cecil Rhodes, but on the enormous contributions our Scholars have made to the world.

And the qualities sought in a Rhodes Scholar - intellectual distinction combined with concern for others, energy to lead, and a focus on public service - remain as compelling as they were over a century ago.

What is the Rhodes Scholarship?

- The Rhodes Scholarship is a fully funded, full time, postgraduate award which enables talented young people from around the world to study at the University of Oxford.
- Applying for the Scholarship is a challenge, and it is an experience which has helped generations of young people to succeed. We encourage applications from talented students everywhere.
- Rhodes Scholars come to the UK for two or more years and can apply to study most full-time postgraduate courses offered by Oxford University.



What are the Selection Criteria?

We are looking for young people of outstanding intellect, character, leadership, and commitment to service.

The criteria which were laid out in the Founder's Will, and have remained largely unchanged since 1902, still guide us today:

- Literary and scholastic attainments (academic excellence);
- Energy to use one's talents to the full (as demonstrated by mastery in areas such as sports, music, debate, dance, theatre, and artistic pursuits, particularly where teamwork is involved);
- Truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindliness, unselfishness and fellowship;
- Moral force of character and instincts to lead, and to take an interest in one's fellow beings.

Are they eligible?





Each applicant must fulfil the citizenship and residency requirements of the Rhodes constituency for which they are applying.



Age limits vary between constituencies, ranging between 18 to 24 years and up to a maximum of 26 years in exceptional circumstances.



They must have completed an undergraduate degree (usually a Bachelor's) by July 2025, and they must have an academic background and grade that - at a minimum - meets or exceeds the specific entry requirements of their chosen course at the University of Oxford.

Candidates will have a higher chance of successful admission to Oxford if they have:

- A First Class Honours Degree or equivalent, or,
- A GPA of 3.70/4.0 or higher


Academic Statement

The reference letters - How can you help?

References form a crucial part of the selection process, and therefore a reference could make the difference to an applicant's success.

- Make sure you understand what's required from you, read the guidance for referees
- You can ask the applicant their CV, transcript, papers they have written in class etc.
- Can you speak to both their strengths and weaknesses?
- What experiences they had can you speak to that would draw out the best of their qualities and values?





- Are they eligible?
- What do they want to achieve with the Rhodes?
- Do they meet the Rhodes selection criteria?
- Would other scholarship opportunities be better suited?

- Help them think about which referees would be best
- Recommend that they check the Rhodes Trust website, and review the 'resources' section
- Have they started to think about their personal statement?

- Have they done a professional interview before?
- Recommend practicing interview skills, and that they ask for help with mock interviews
