Section II: News and Updates

The Inaugural Rhodes China Alumni Event and Sailing Dinner on June 6, 2020

The Inaugural Rhodes China Alumni Event and Sailing Dinner was held on June 6, 2020 at Canada House, Beijing with the support of Rhodes Trustee Emeritus Dominic Barton (British Columbia & Brasenose 1984), the National Secretaries of the Rhodes Scholarships for China, Dr. Diana Fu (Manitoba & Linacre 2006) and Mark Jia (New Jersey & Merton 2011), and Naying Ren (China & Linacre 2016). Fourteen attendees including Rhodes Scholars and Friends gathered for this special

occasion despite the pandemic. Warden Elizabeth and the National Secretaries Diana and Mark sent videos to congratulate us on the success of the event and bid the Scholars-Elect an early farewell. During dinner, memories of Oxford and experience regarding studying in Oxford were shared, along with discussions around the current COVID-19 pandemic and its impact. Scholars-Elect took the chance to ask about life in Oxford, and Rhodes Scholars and Friends shared their views on the future of the Rhodes Scholarship in China.



Chinese Scholar Fireside Chat on May 14, 2020

Four Chinese Rhodes Scholars, Naying Ren (China & Linacre 2016), Chunying Zhang (China & Lady Margaret Hall 2016), Xilin Jiang (China & University 2017) and Yuhan Li (China & Magdalen 2018) shared their personal experiences during the COVID-19 pandemic at this fireside chat event facilitated by Serena Dai (Hong Kong & St. Catherine's 2016). Joined by Scholar Alumni and Current Scholars located all over the world, these Scholars shared their experiences from different perspectives: Naying as an NGO worker and activist, Chunying as a journalist, Xilin as a member of the data modeling team for the Chinese CDC, and Yuhan as an MPhil student studying the wildlife trade in China. The audience raised many questions worth lengthy discussion, and the Chinese Scholars shared their observations and thoughts on how China and the rest of the world was affected by the COVID-19 pandemic – from government policy, NGO response, and community action to media reporting during a crisis and how different people viewed wildlife consumption and trade before and after COVID-19.

Chinese Scholar Zoom Chat on April 12, 2020

Twenty-five Chinese Scholars located in different places all over the world got together on Zoom to check in with each other and share their thoughts and expertise on COVID-19's impact on today's world. This was the first time alumni, Current Scholars, and Scholars Elect "met" outside of Oxford and chatted in Chinese about how they were affected by COVID-19, and what their thoughts were on the current situation. Scholars from a STEM background shared their knowledge about COVID-19 and infectious disease while Scholars who specialized in social sciences led discussions about the impact of COVID-19 on citizen-government relationships and the balance between fighting COVID-19 and protecting citizen rights. In addition, Scholars with a law background shared their views regarding legal discussions around COVID-19, and topics like the responsibility of the media and NGOs were shared.

She is working on translations of contemporary Chinese fiction into English under the tutelage of esteemed translator Jeremy Tiang.

Report from Jackson Zhao (China & Green Templeton 2019):

The last year has marked a U-shape experience for Current Scholars. The first half is uplifting. From last September to late February, the new 2019 Chinese Scholars were warmly welcomed by the lovely Rhodes community. The academic year started with a constituency dinner hosted by Xilin Jiang (China & University 2017), who awed everyone present with his fabulous cooking skills. Many Chinese Scholars have contributed towards the fight against the pandemic in their own ways and were featured in Rhodes House's [Global Map of Scholars Working on COVID-19](#).

Collectively, Chinese Scholars donated a shipment of face masks to Rhodes House in March for the most

vulnerable members of the community and organised an online webinar in April to share the situation and lived experienced in China during the pandemic with members of the global scholar community. We hope that life will gradually go back to normal soon in the future, when current and new scholars will be able to gather at Oxford!

6. Introduction of 2020 Scholars-Elect

Jun Gao

Jun Gao recently graduated from the Global Environment Program at Tsinghua University and won the Outstanding Graduate Award of Beijing. She was a visiting student at Oxford as one of ten 2018 Yinghua Scholars. Dedicated to pursuing a career as an environmental researcher and advocate in China, she has conducted research at top universities, the governmental agency and NGOs, presented at the UNFCCC COP24, cooperated with UNICEF to tackle SDGs and built arsenic-reduction facilities for rural communities. She is also an accomplished rhythmic gymnast. She hopes to combine her knowledge of environmental science and economics to better promote sustainable development.

Yan (Ryan) Yan

Yan Yan recently graduated from Nanjing University with a BSc in Applied Psychology. She was a visiting student in experimental psychology at Oxford. Outside of academics, Yan has contributed to LGBTQ equality and taught underprivileged adolescents. She also edited a campus literature magazine and served as a translator and interpreter. Yan is interested in the neuroscience of mood and anxiety disorders and hopes to become a clinical psychologist dedicated to psychopathology research that is socially informative.

Xiaorui Zhou

Xiaorui Zhou recently graduated with highest honours from a Dual BA Programme between the National University of Singapore and Sciences Po. She received the NTUC gold medal for top student in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences and the Sung Kah Kay Memorial Prize for best exemplifying scholarship in the NUS University Scholars' Programme. Her thesis, 'Homebound Women', received the Wong Lin Ken Memorial Prize for best thesis. This is her second year

running Project Initium, a free humanities camp she co-founded in 2019 for high school graduates from rural counties in the Southwest. She aspires to be a scholar and writer of modern China, with much to tell the world.

Yuan Zhang

Yuan Zhang received a Bachelor's degree in Architecture and a Master's degree in Global Affairs from Tsinghua University. She studied Chinese classical space, gardens, and landscape for her undergraduate and graduate capstone projects, both of which received awards for top 1% theses at Tsinghua. Yuan also led several design projects focused on improving living conditions of transient populations. Yuan's ambition is to become an interdisciplinary scholar in architecture and anthropology. She will read the MPhil in Social Anthropology at Oxford.

The Publicity & Outreach Team for Rhodes China 2020 Highlights:

- On June 8, National Co-Secretary Professor Diana Fu hosted an [online webinar](#) via the University of Toronto for prospect applicants worldwide, with 2019 Scholar Yan Chen as a panelist. Over 200 students across the world tuned in. For recap, read [here](#) or watch [here](#).
- Rhodes China WeChat account received 31,144 reads and attracted 570 more followers from late May to mid July. The total number of followers passed 10,000 – a landmark achievement.
- Rhodes China Weibo has established partnerships the University of Oxford's official account and Zhishi Fenzi. The number of Weibo followers increased by 400 over the past month.
- The team has published eight articles since late May, including [the application call](#), [global scholars' response to Covid-19](#), Warden Kiss's [statement](#) on the Black Lives Matter movement, a [recap](#) of National Co-Secretary Dr. Diana Fu's online info session, in-depth interviews with [Michael Szonyi](#) and [Yifan Hou](#), and [the upcoming Asian Rhodes Scholars webinar](#).
- The team has reached out to 26 universities to reach underrepresented regions and universities in

China. 9 of them have published the Rhodes Scholarship application call on their respective websites or social media platforms.
