POST-EVENT REPORT

It was wonderful to see our Scholars from across the world at the annual alumni get-together on Wednesday 10 May 2023. Over 100 Scholars, representing seven decades of Scholars, signed up for this virtual event.

Kumi Naidoo (South Africa-at-Large & Magdalen 1987), global champion of climate and social justice and moral lodestar, delivered the keynote address in brilliant style. He cautioned that the decade ahead was perhaps the most important in our history, and could determine humankind's future. Kumi noted that "pessimism was a luxury the world cannot afford". Given the perfect storm of crises facing our planet (pandemics, climate change, poverty and inequality), the key leadership challenge is to keep younger generations energized on the tasks ahead. Joining the event from San Francisco, Kirsty Bobrow (South Africa-at-Large & Magdalen 2004) spoke about her medical research into dementia and "brain health in Africa". Kirsty cautioned that tech does not always provide a silver bullet to solve all ills and that there are often lots of other treatments – albeit more difficult and sometimes less 'sexy' - that may be a lot more effective. Kirsty shared brilliant insights about the role of data, generative AI, and narrative in the public healthcare landscape.

Thanks to the Warden, Elizabeth Kiss, who concluded the programme with an update on the latest Rhodes Trust news, highlighting the progress made to the revamp of Rhodes House, and the success of the Africa Impact Initiative, for which resident Rhodes Scholars (including some SA scholars) successfully raised funds for grassroots African NGOs working in education.

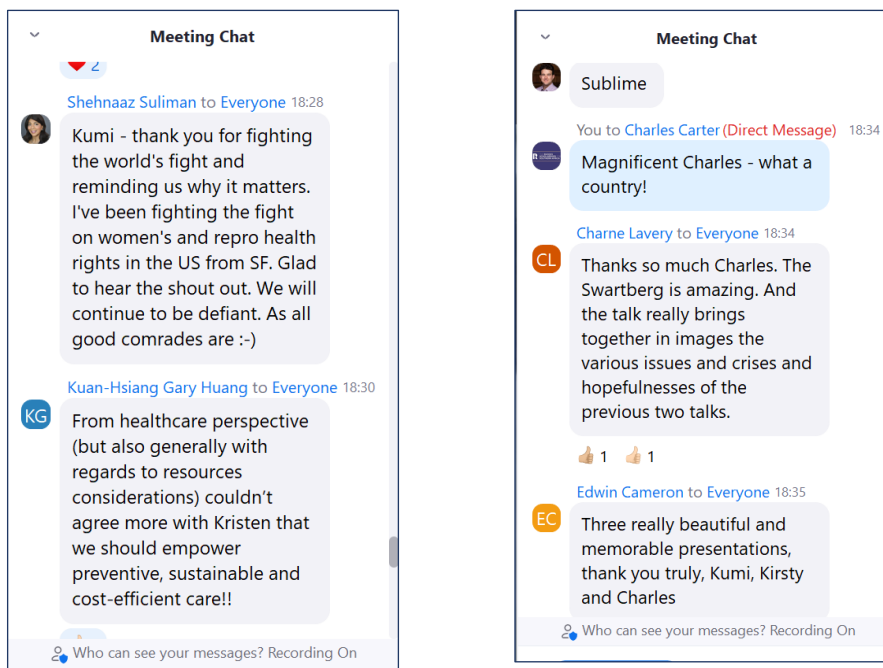
Scholars enjoyed engaging with the speakers, and spent time in virtual break-out rooms catching up with old friends and making new connections.
